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Neuro Physical Exam Documentation

NEURO: Mental status: The patient is alert, attentive, and oriented. Speech: clear and fluent with good repetition, comprehension, and naming. She recalls 3/3 objects at 5 minutes. Cranial nerves: CN II: Visual fields are full to confrontation. Fundoscopic exam is normal with sharp discs. Pupils are 4 mm and briskly reactive to light.

Documentation of a basic, normal neuro exam should look something along the lines of the following: The patient is alert and oriented to person, place, and time with normal speech. No motor deficits are noted, with muscle strength 5/5 bilaterally. Sensation is intact bilaterally.

The neurological exam The neurological exam can be divided into seven areas. The outline below should be memorized. Having immediate recall of this outline allows the examiner to quickly proceed through the exam without omitting any sections. The exam should be performed in an organized, step-wise manner.

What is a neurological exam? A neurological exam, also called a neuro exam, is an evaluation of a person's nervous system that can be done in the healthcare provider's office.It may be done with instruments, such as lights and reflex hammers. It usually does not cause any pain to the patient.

In the neurological exam above all others, inspection is vital. Introduce yourself with a (careful) hand shake. This may provide the first clue to diagnosis: Unable to see your hand (neglect, blindness) Unable to lift their hand to shake yours (paralysis, weakness) Unable to easily release your hand (myotonic dystrophy) Overall inspection
